Officials and Respect in Sport

Skate Canada places the highest priority on a safe and fun learning environment for all its participants. As a community, we need to work together to provide a safe environment and that means making sure the education and training is available for all stakeholders.

Last season, Skate Canada made the Respect in Sport – Activity Leader training mandatory for all officials. Respect in Sport educates activity leaders including officials to recognize, understand and respond to issues of bullying, abuse, harassment and discrimination. This training will assist officials in creating a safe, healthy, respectful environment. It will help them in recognizing when a child may be at risk and will help them to be prepared in the event of a disclosure as well as the many ethical decisions one can face throughout the season.

This education is a key component of Skate Canada's Safe Sport program and we encourage officials who have not had the opportunity to take the training to do so. The Respect in Sport training is available through the eLearning site and is a mandatory training for officials to complete prior to officiating during the 2020/21 season. If you have completed the training, it is valid for three years.

We appreciate your commitment to keeping our sport safe.

In looking forward to the 2020-2021 season, the OAP plans to further develop and/or refine many of the initiatives of the past two seasons, as well as move forward with a few new priorities. Below is a snapshot of some of these items:



Essential/Soft Skills Webinar: A new Essential/Soft Skills Webinar will be launched on the Skate Canada eLearning site. This webinar focuses on the importance and development of essential/soft skills in the officials' community. It will focus on the concept of "aiming to be a zero" and how you can implement these concepts into your officiating. Once the webinar is live, a communication will be sent to all challenge and higher officials. However, if you would like to get a head start on this topic, you could read Chapter 9 of An Astronaut's Guide to Life by Chris Hadfield. Thank-you to Benoit Lavoie, Susan Heffernan, and Nicole LeBlanc Richard for their efforts in this webinar.









<u>Event Reports and Performance Feedback</u>: Referees and Technical Controllers are required to complete a report for each event at domestic competitions. This report provides an opportunity for them to give feedback and recommendations to the Skate Canada Event Team on logistics as well as to OAP on the officiating performances of the judging/technical panels. I would like to again take this opportunity to share with you below the criteria used on these two reports:

INDIVIDUAL RATINGS

Using the rating scale listed below, please provide a rating for each of the judges/technical members on your panels for this event. Consider the following under each category:

Technical Skills:

<u>Judges:</u> Understanding of rules, integration of quality in GOE assessments, effective use of positive GOE's, accuracy of reductions, appropriate assignment of PC scores, reflects PC differences when warranted

<u>Technical Panel:</u> Understanding of technical knowledge/rules, calling process, review process, team work

<u>Leadership/Deportment:</u> Self-management during competition and ability to manage stress, open-mindedness to other opinions, acts appropriately in situations, interacts well and/or demonstrates respect for athletes, officials, SC staff, volunteers, stakeholders

M-Meeting expectations of judging level of this event *no comment necessary or per referee's/TC's discretion

U-Unsure of ability/skill set/deportment at this event *please provide comments for the OAP committee

The objective of this performance management aspect of the event report is to watch for a pattern and not a "one off" bad day, which can happen to any of us. With the goal of transparency of these reports, it was felt it was important to share this with all Challenge and higher level officials. If a pattern is noted throughout a competition, the OAP will provide the individual official with this feedback once all reports have been received, as well as provide them with suggestions on how to address the areas of development.









Referee and Technical Controller Feedback: Judges and technical panels are also given the opportunity to provide feedback on their respective referees and technical controllers. We have 360 degree feedback in order to help us determine our strengths and areas for development, which will help guide our training initiatives.



<u>Maple Leaf March:</u> Skate Canada was set to host a seminar in June 2020 on the Maple Leaf March (the new pattern dance for the 2021-2022 season), however this has been postponed until May 2021. Stay tuned for more details about this seminar, which will be open to International and higher Ice Dance Officials.

In closing, it has once again been a wonderful year of great skating served by our officials in all roles at all levels across Canada and at International events around the world. Again, we thank you for your dedication to our sport, and your tremendous efforts throughout the year.
