# **2022-2023 SEASON**

The start of the 2022-2023 season saw the Program Components changed from 5 PCs to 3 PCs for all disciplines. We all had a quick turn-around to prepare for the new season! A big thank you to Karen Howard and Nicole LeBlanc-Richard who worked together to prepare a webinar for Skate Canada's eLearning site which was available for all judges in the country to access prior to fall competitions. The ISU produced comprehensive videos for each of the new Program Components and thanks to Leanna Caron, we were fortunate to have access to this material from the get-go. Thank you to all judges for embracing change and applying your new learnings at events this season.

A new initiative this season was an officials educational opportunity offered by Skate Canada to each Section. Most Sections chose to have an in-depth session with Karen Howard on the new Program Components – Karen was a bit of a travelling roadshow! Nova Scotia and Manitoba opted for a Pairs seminar for their officials and New Brunswick a Synchro clinic.

#### **Junior World Officials Development Program 2023**



Skate Canada hosted an Officials Development Program at the 2023 ISU World Junior Figure Skating Championships in Calgary Alberta. Eleven officials were selected by the OAP committee and supported by their section to participate in this program, facilitated by Andrew Bosco and Erica Topolski. The program provided candidates with exposure to live international level pairs and ice dance skating with the intention of further developing knowledge of pairs and ice dance as multi discipline officials. Guest speakers included ISU delegates and international coaches and judges from around the world.

"The Officials Development Program was an amazing and memorable opportunity for us participants. For the first time, Skate Canada hosted two separate Challenge events- Challenge Junior/Senior and Challenge Pre-Novice/Novice. As always, these competitions brought together officials from Coast to Coast. Thank you to all who participated in the Skate Canada Challenges. Your time and expertise contribute to the success of these important national qualifying competitions.

"It was a wonderful opportunity to receive an invitation to be a Technical Representative at the 2023 Challenge in Regina. Working with the team whose focus was ensuring the competition ran smoothly was very satisfying. My Tech Rep partner was Deirdre Coburn and we worked closely with Beth Liverman

#### **2024 ISU World Skating Championships**

Skate Canada is hosting the 2024 ISU World Figure Skating Championships. We will be hosting an officials development program at the world championships. Stay tuned for more details on this program.



#### **Synchronized Skating Seminar**

The ISU has accepted Skate Canada's application to host a synchronized skating seminar for our international and ISU officials. This seminar will take place in Toronto from September 29<sup>th</sup>-October 1<sup>st</sup>. Pending approval from the ISU, national officials may be invited to attend.



#### **OAP Goal Meetings**

This season there will be the opportunity to request a Goals Meeting with a member of the OAP. These were very successful in 2021-2022 and the intent of the OAP is to offer these on a bi-annual basis.





#### **Individual Feedback**

As a result of numerous requests from officials, the OAP intends to summarize any critical feedback submitted in referee and TC reports, as well as in evaluation surveys to individual officials. This will provide officials with individualized information to grow and develop their officiating skills.



#### **Event Reports and Performance Feedback**

Referees and Technical Controllers are required to complete a report for each event at domestic competitions. This report provides an opportunity for them to give feedback and recommendations to the Skate Canada Event Team on logistics as well as to OAP on the officiating performances of the judging/technical panels. I would like to again take this opportunity to share with you below the criteria used on these two reports:

#### **INDIVIDUAL RATINGS**

Using the rating scale listed below, please provide a rating for each of the judges/technical members on your panels for this event. Consider the following under each category:

#### **Technical Skills:**

<u>Judges:</u> Understanding of rules, integration of quality in GOE assessments, effective use of positive GOE's, accuracy of reductions, appropriate assignment of PC scores, reflects PC differences when warranted

<u>Technical Panel:</u> Understanding of technical knowledge/rules, calling process, review process, team work

<u>Leadership/Deportment:</u> Self-management during competition and ability to manage stress, open-mindedness to other opinions, acts appropriately in situations, interacts well and/or demonstrates respect for athletes, officials, SC staff, volunteers, stakeholders

M-Meeting expectations of judging level of this event\*no comment necessary or per referee's/TC's discretion

**U-**Unsure of ability/skill set/deportment at this event \*please provide comments for the OAP committee

The objective of this performance management aspect of the event report is to watch for a pattern and not a "one off" bad day, which can happen to any of us. With the goal of transparency of these reports, the OAP feels it is important to share this with all Challenge and higher-level officials. If a pattern is noted throughout a competition, the OAP will provide the individual official with this feedback once all reports have been received, as well as provide them with suggestions on how to address the areas of development.
